Copyright

What is copyright?

Copyright (or author's right) is a legal term used to describe the **rights** (economic & moral) that creators have over their literary and artistic works. Works covered by copyright range from books, music, paintings, sculpture, and films, to computer programs, databases, advertisements, maps, and technical drawings.

Copyright law

Learn the copyright law of your country to understand your rights on the educational material you create and your obligations to material of others that you want to use

Use Open Educational Resources (OER)

What are OER?

the concept of Open Educational Resources (OER) describes **any educational resources** that are **openly available for use** by educators and students, **without** an accompanying need to **pay royalties or licence fees**

Difference of OER with other educational material

there is **only** one key differentiator between an OER and any other educational resource: its **licence**. Thus, an OER is simply an educational resource that incorporates a licence that facilitates reuse, and potentially adaptation, **without first requesting permission from the copyright holder**.

The open licenses: Creative Commons

Scope

protect a copyright holder's rights in environments where content (particularly when digitized) can so easily be copied and shared via the Internet **without asking permission**

legal mechanisms to ensure that authors of materials can **retain acknowledgement** for their work while allowing it to be shared, can seek to restrict commercial activity if they wish, and can aim to prevent people from adapting it if appropriate.



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Create content

Effective Videos (Brame, 2015)

- Keep videos brief and targeted on learning goals.
- Use audio and visual elements to convey appropriate parts of an explanation; make them complementary rather than redundant.
- Use signaling to highlight important ideas or concepts.
- Use a conversational, enthusiastic style to enhance engagement.
- Embed videos in a context of active learning by using guiding questions, interactive elements, or associated homework assignments.

 Write everything on a paper and on podcasting use it it

Open tools for video

Creating video and animation programs can be complex so there are only few open source programs for video editing

Other option:

• Export slides from office tools to video

Publish your educational material online


Make your materials available online at a publically-available URL. If you aren't able to publish to your own website/campus LMS, you can use one of the following options.
