- Impacts on Internationalization globally
- * Internationalization has characterized the development of Africa's HE sector (Teferra, 2008; Jowi, 2010)
- * Due to several challenges- Africa's HE cant effectively respond to the pandemic
- * Teaching, Learning, Research, Community engagementgrounded

Introduction

- Internationalization is at the core of higher education (IAU, 2010)
- Africa's higher education is largely an offshoot of internationalization initiatives
- Internationalization has continued to shape & characterize Africa's HE
- Africa engages with internationalization amid several challenges some of which bring in risks
- Main rationale enhance research capacity, academic quality, curriculum strengthening, new generation of academics (IAU, 2010)
- Needs to produce, seek & adapt knowledge to overcome its developmental challenges
- Must be part of global knowledge economy locally relevant and globally competitive
- Because of limited resources, this can only be achieved by collaboration among African countries & their HE systems
- Hence the need for a strong continental HE 'space' & partnerships

Policy Priorities

- Returning to normalcy- strategies/policies towards re-opening universities and catching up with lost time
- Continuation of learning- biggest hurdle now is provision of learning opportunities when students are at home.
- Policies and frameworks for quality online learning
- * Mitigating effects on international research projects
- * Policies for deepening research collaborations/ mobility
- Strengthening regional and continental efforts
- * Support for investments in ICT, teacher development & students support
- Localization vs globalization-address local issues for relevance
- * Affirmation of policy positions

Challenges and Barriers to Policy Alignment

- Inadequate policies and strategies to facilitate internationalization.
- The rise of nationalism and protectionist (inward looking) policies
- * Emergent disruptions-research projects, forums, conferences etc.
- Impacts on regional laws, regulations and protocols e.g regional cooperation
- * Funding for Internationalization- worsened by impacts of pandemic on economies
- * Shifts in priority during the pandemic.
- * Endemic risks associated with internationalization
- National and institutional capacity deficits- learner, teacher preparedness
- Weak ICT infrastructure to support online learning
- Lack of preparedness- this was like an emergency and caught universities unawares

- * Time for renewal/ relevance of universities to their missions.
- Enhanced and meaningful collaborations- hold together
- * Development of supportive policies and strategies
- Investment in ICT for e-learning, new forms of engagement- support internationalization

- Support African Centres of excellence- specialized training/interventions
- Strengthening intra-Africa collaborations
- Participation and strengthening global knowledge networks
- Government commitment to enhance fundingespecially for research
